Dear Resident(s) living in the 2016 Boise Japanese Beetle Treatment Area,

This letter is to notify you that any areas containing grass in the yard of your residence are scheduled to receive treatment for Japanese Beetle control, once again, this coming spring and summer. As in previous years, we are asking you for a record of your consent to allow granular treatment of turf on your property by following the instructions on the attached Consent Form, or the electronic Consent Form which can be accessed on ISDA's website.

Japanese Beetles (JB) are highly invasive insects from the eastern U.S. that were unexpectedly found in large numbers in Boise beginning in the summer of 2012. In addition to severely damaging turf during their larval stage while feeding on grass roots, adult JB attack and can kill over 300 kinds of ornamental and crop plants, while consuming leaves, fruit and flowers. They especially like roses, berry bushes, grapes and fruit trees. If JB were allowed to establish in the Boise area, the entire state would become quarantined for the pest. This could result in numerous negative implications for Idaho's plant nursery industry, for homeowners and gardeners, and eventually for Idaho's agricultural growers and producers.

In order to avoid this outcome, when the JB infestation was first uncovered in Boise, an eradication program was quickly set up to attempt to return Idaho to the JB-free status it has historically enjoyed. The first year that treatment began, in 2013, JB traps in Boise captured 3,058 beetles. In 2014, as a result of the pesticide applications in 2013, overall JB numbers dropped to 1,283. A 95% beetle reduction was seen in the Warm Springs neighborhood where initial treatments were undertaken (beetles trapped there decreased from 1,903 in 2013 to just 91 in 2014). Following a second summer of treatment, the traps set out in 2015 collected only 365 beetles throughout Boise with catches at "ground zero" in Warm Springs down from 91 to 18 individuals.

During 2015, ISDA treated 14 Boise parks and nearly 2,000 residential/commercial properties encompassing most of the areas where JB had previously been captured. Fortunately, as a result of beetle numbers dropping significantly - with many locations now appearing to be JB-free - many formerly treated areas can now be removed from the eradication program. For 2016, the proposed treatment area has decreased to 11 parks and 800 residential and commercial properties. With your cooperation areas requiring treatment will continue to shrink dramatically in the future.

This successful eradication program will continue as before with two granular insecticide treatments applied on all lawns in areas where beetles were trapped last year (for more detailed information on the chemicals being used, their safety and treatment protocol please see the FAQ sheet on the Japanese Beetle Project page of ISDA's website). These treatments, one in May and one in July, will target to kill young JB larvae in the soil. Ground application of granular insecticide in areas of your yard containing turf is the only action planned this season. Nothing will be sprayed with any liquid pesticide. Flower and vegetable gardens, bushes and trees will not be treated – only grass. ISDA is in the process of contracting a professional pest control service to conduct

these treatments at no cost to you. As has been done in the past, all pesticides will be applied in strict accordance with label directions and all recommended safety precautions will be stringently followed. In addition to this letter you can expect to receive follow-up notification about treatment approximately one week before each insecticide application. At that time you will be informed of the exact date treatment has been scheduled for your property and of any preparations you should make.

The Boise JB eradication program has now been in place for several years and, as a result, most of the concerns and questions voiced by the affected public have been addressed in the FAQ sheet on the Japanese Beetle Project page of ISDA's website. The site also contains additional information about JB biology, history of the Idaho JB infestation as well as maps detailing treatment plans and trapping data.
